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ramadan in this work lays out the basic ideas he stands for in clear and accessible prose he describes the book as a work of clarification directed at ordinary citizens politicians journalist and others who are curious or skeptical about his positions aware that that he is dealing with emotional issues ramadan tries to get past the barriers of prejudice and misunderstanding to speak directly from the heart to his muslim and non muslim readers alike

from one of the most prominent intellectuals in the muslim world comes a timely new introduction to one of the world s most practiced and most misunderstood religions in frank unapologetic language tariq ramadan walks readers through islam and its principles rituals diversity and evolution ramadan known for his efforts to reform and change the understanding of islam in the west avoids ideology and idealism instead attempting to depict the true meaning of islam for readers who have no previous experience with the religion the book is therefore focused on defining the basic principles of islam and offering an overview of the faith s history from its beginnings in prophetic mission to the sunni shi a schism to the formation of distinct schools of law theology philosophy and mysticism perhaps the most misinterpreted aspect of islam shariah literally translated as the way that leads to a source of water receives an entire chapter of attention ramadan explains the ways in which shariah has been reduced by fundamentalism to a mere criminal code and expands upon its place in the larger islamic worldview he then confronts some of the most pressing issues facing muslims today including gender equality religious diversity and violence both sensitive and accessible introduction to islam is a much needed guide to understanding the role of islam in the modern world

tradition and modernity focuses on how christians and muslims connect their traditions to modernity looking especially at understandings of history changing patterns of authority and approaches to freedom the volume includes a selection of relevant texts from 19th and 20th century thinkers from john henry newman to tariq ramadan accompanied by illuminating commentaries

suspensions about the integration of islam into european cultures have been steadily on the rise and dramatically so since 9 11 one reason lies in the visibility of anti western islamic discourses of salafi origin which have monopolized the debate on the true islam not only among muslims but also in the eyes of the general population across europe these discourses combined with islamophobic discourses reinforce the so called incompatibility between the west and islam this book breaks away from this clash between islam and the west by arguing that european islam is possible it analyzes the contribution that european islam has made to the formation of an innovative islamic theology that is deeply ethicist and modern and it clarifies how this constructed european islamic theology is able to contribute to the various debates that are related to secular liberal democracies of western europe part i introduces four major projects that defend the idea of european islam from different disciplines and perspectives politics political theology jurisprudence and philosophy part ii uses the frameworks from three major philosophers and scholars to approach the idea of european islam in the context of secular liberal societies british scholar george hourani moroccan philosopher taha abderrahmane and the american philosopher john rawls the book shows that the ongoing efforts of european muslim thinkers to revisit the concept of citizenship and political community can be seen as a new kind of political theology in opposition to radical forms of islamic thinking in some muslim majority countries opening a new path for examining islamic thought in and of europe this book will appeal to students and scholars of islamic studies islam in the west and political theology

the education provided by canada s faith based schools is a subject of public political and scholarly controversy as the population becomes more religiously diverse the continued establishment and support of faith based schools has reignited debates about whether they should be funded publicly and to what extent they threaten social cohesion these discussions tend to occur without considering a fundamental question how do faith based schools envision and enact their educational missions discipline devotion and dissent offers responses to that question by examining a selection of canada s jewish catholic and islamic schools the daily reality of these schools is illuminated through essays that address the aims and practices that characterize these schools how they prepare their students to become citizens of a multicultural canada and how they respond to dissent in the classroom the essays in this book reveal that canada s faith based schools sometimes succeed and sometimes struggle in bridging the demands of the faith and the need to create participating citizens of a multicultural society discussion surrounding faith based schools in canada would be enriched by a better understanding of the aims and practices of these schools and this book provides a gateway to the subject

presents a vivid and compelling picture of the human face behind the veil of the axis of evil and sets out an alternative roadmap for better relations between the west and the muslim world going beyond the stereotypes and below the media radar this book explains why contrary to the popular perception they don't hate us or at least not yet

the global movement of culture and religion has brought about a serious challenge to traditional constitutional secularism this challenge comes in the form of a political and institutional struggle against secular constitutionalism and a two pronged assault on the very legitimacy and viability of the concept on the one hand constitutional secularism has been attacked as inherently hostile rather than neutral toward religion and on the other hand constitutional secularism has been criticized as inevitably favouring one religion or set of religions over others the contributors to this book come from a variety of different disciplines including law anthropology history philosophy and political theory they provide accounts of and explanations for present predicaments critiques of contemporary institutional political and cultural arrangements justifications and practices and suggestions with a view to overcoming or circumventing several of the seemingly intractable or insurmountable current controversies and deadlocks the book is separated into five parts part i provides theoretical perspectives on the present day conflicts between secularism and religion part ii focuses on the relationship between religion secularism and the public sphere part iii examines the nexus between religion secularism and women's equality part iv concentrates on religious perspectives on constraints on and accommodations of religion within the precincts of the liberal state finally part v zeroes in on conflicts between religion and secularism in specific contexts namely education and freedom of speech

this book is part of the wider study of islam and the west a history of european mainly french and english intellectual responses to islam from the seventeenth century onwards it focuses on the nineteenth century studies on islam and the west have so far tended to be dominated by non muslim writers this study therefore attempts to put forward a scholarly muslim point of view on a subject which has acquired increasing importance in our time relying on primary european and islamic source materials it remains firmly committed to the notion of fidelity to european thought it paves the way to a constructive dialogue between equals islam and the west

the strength of the initial revolutionary movements in tunisia egypt libya or syria lay in not having a specific leadership rather these movements comprised men and women from different classes backgrounds and religions all coming together in egypt this was very apparent many came together from a variety of secular leftist and islamist groups there was no leadership it was clear from the very beginning that these were not islamist revolutions as some labeled them the islamists in many of these countries joined the efforts afterwards in fact in the beginning the islamists were very hesitant to become involved the first to push the islamist movement to participate were the young members of tunisia's al nahda for the muslim brotherhood in egypt the group's leadership initially said that they would not be involved but they were then encouraged to do so by the younger generation within the brotherhood it was quite clear that there was and remains a fracture concerning strategy whilst the lack of a central leadership brought the initial movements strength it was to become their weakness why we know now that following the removal of the dictators it quickly became apparent that there was a lack of vision and clarity about what the people actually wanted all we know is what they didn't want

so we are still unsure as to what the future will hold across the board the movements early strength became their weakness from the secularists to the islamists these pertinent questions persist what is the future and what do they want these questions must be applied from the outset in order to understand the strengths and weaknesses of these movements ultimately the situation is complex with many issues to consider this is where we are a complex region facing complex challenges with complex dimensions consequently it pays to be cautious when attempting to predict future developments in muslim majority countries the current period is quite critical a turning point something has changed and we can t go back it is now up to the young generation even the islamists my position on this is quite clear it can t be done by killing or torturing people if someone is dealing with politics be they secular or islamist it doesn t matter as long as he or she is non violent and respects the rule of law and the democratic process he or she is entitled to be involved in the process and be part of the political discussion why because is it good for all of us it is good for you because there is nothing in islam and this is my position that says that religion should take over the state it should be about democratic and majority processes this is islamic
